



2010 Saskatchewan Employment Forecast

Detailed Occupational Outlook (2009-2014)

This profile provides a medium term employment outlook for 354 occupations in Saskatchewan over the five year period, 2009 to 2014. Profiled occupations are ranked as having good, fair, or limited employment prospects. The majority of occupations (60%) require management skills and/or post-secondary education and training.

Of those occupations ranked as ‘good’, a large majority (99 of 129) require either management skills, a university degree, and/or a post secondary certificate/diploma. Many of these positions are in management, engineering, technical and technological areas, the trades, and the health field.

For occupations with ‘fair’ employment prospects, a significant number (121 of 178) require post-secondary education or training. Examples in this category include management positions, computer related occupations, and teaching professions.

The majority of occupations with ‘limited’ employment prospects also require post-secondary education or training (28 of 47). Examples include the fine arts, trades and transport, manufacturing and processing, and occupations in the primary industries.

- Good prospects - 129 occupations (37%)
- Fair prospects - 178 occupations (50%)
- Limited prospects - 47 occupations (13%)

The National Occupational Classification (NOC) system provides a standardizing framework for organizing occupations. Occupations are classified by the level of education or training that is usually required for a given occupation, referred to as the skill level. The following table provides a description of the skill levels used in this document. Occupations are arranged by employment outlook, then by skill level (alterations between white and orange sections indicate a change in the skill level).

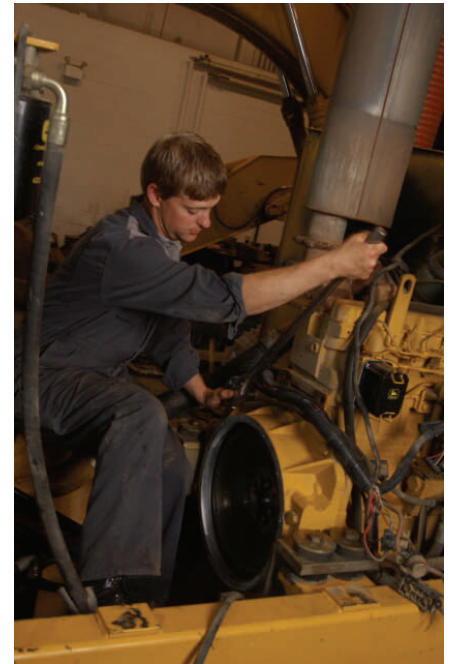

Data Details

Information used in the indicators includes:

- **Current labour market indicators:** recent employment growth, employment growth from the Census, share of recent total employment growth, wage rates, changes in average hours worked and unemployment rates.
- **Future labour market indicators:** Saskatchewan Employment Forecast (SEF) five-year growth rates and attrition rates, and shares of SEF forecasted growth.
- **Other data:** administrative data such as new immigrant and foreign worker activity, Employment Insurance claims and SaskJobs.ca vacancies. Other related qualitative data was also used.

Other data sources:

- The number of people employed in Saskatchewan - 2006 Census, Statistics Canada.
- Full-time/Full-year wage estimate - Service Canada using Statistic Canada sources including: 2006 Census; Survey of Employment, Payroll and Hours; and the Labour Force Survey.



Economic and Labour Market Update

- The 2010 Saskatchewan Employment Forecast, the basis of the employment indicators in this publication, is based on assumptions that reflected current and expected economic conditions *at the time of the development of the forecast scenario* (Spring 2010).
- Changes in economic conditions can occur that will impact the forecast, such as the slowdown in the United States and other global markets, fluctuations in commodity prices and the appreciation of the Canadian dollar.
- The economic environment is constantly changing and evolving and can be subject to unanticipated changes.
- Current economic and labour market conditions should be considered when using forecasts and projections.
- Excluded occupations are those with fewer than 100 people employed or jobs placed in the catch-all category of “other”.
- Supporting information for each occupation includes the skill level, number of people employed, and an average full-time/full-year wage estimate. These rankings were developed in summer/fall 2010. Current and future labour market indicators were used to develop the prospects (see page 10 for further details). Rankings were developed for use in the Saskatchewan Job Futures suite of products.

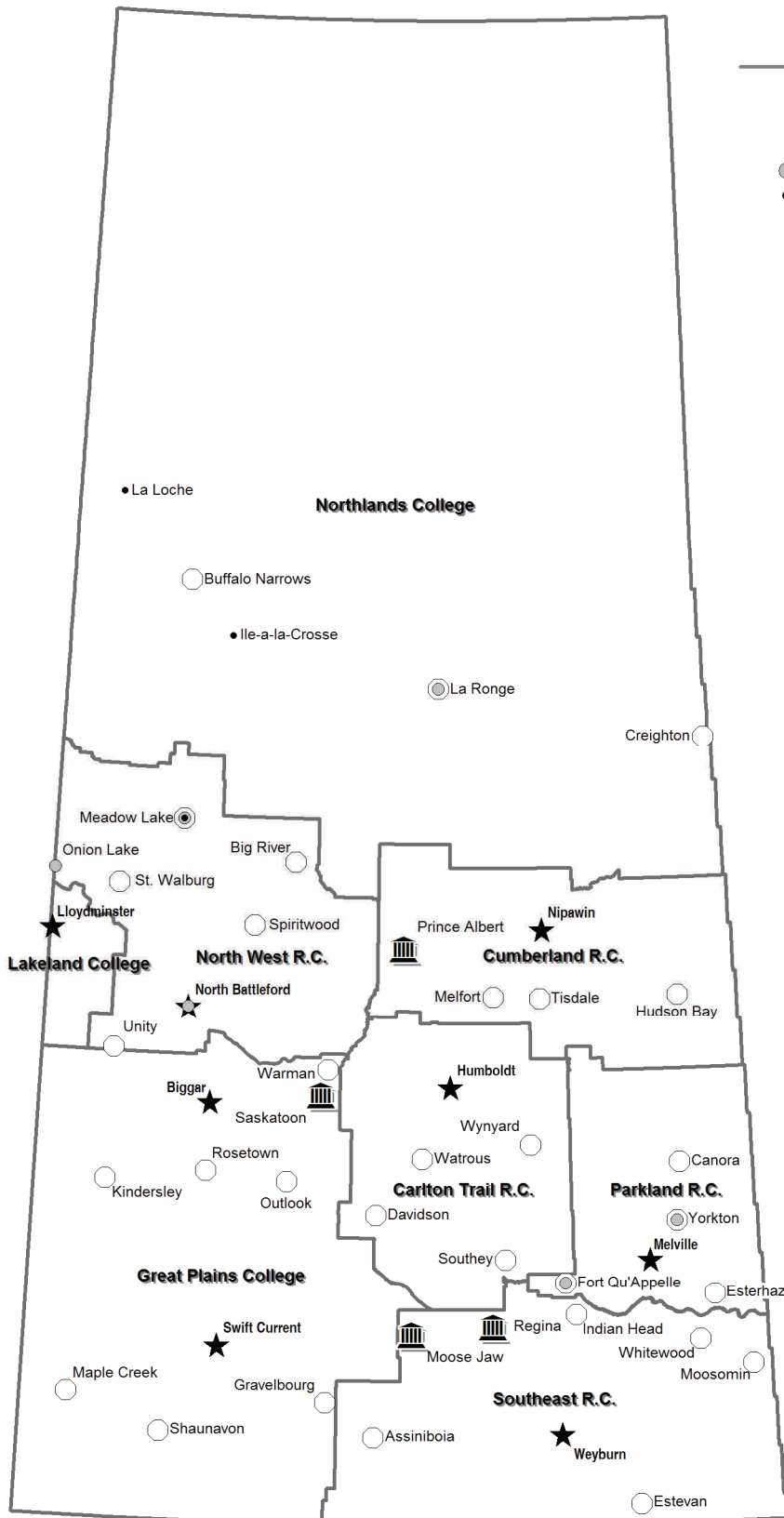
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Saskatchewan Public Post-Secondary Institutions
